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A review of our year, February thru May...

**In early January** your Officers and Board members were sworn in, Committees were appointed, and by February our first newsletter was mailed to Madeira Historical Society members. Our

first program, "Diamond in the Rough", exploring the history of Madeira's oldest structure was well attended. The program was presented by Ken Cummings, owner of the historic school building located on Shawnee Run Road. There was a discussion with Mr. Cummings regarding the possibilities for preserving the school building but nothing substantial came from those discussions.



**Over the years,** hosting an Easter Egg Hunt at the Miller House had been discussed but this year there were compelling reasons persuading the society board members that an Easter Egg



hunt would be a good idea. Plastic Eggs were purchased, the event was advertised on social media, and candy was bought and put in the hundreds of eggs. The society even had an Easter Bunny. The children and their parents attending the Easter Egg hunt had a great, fun time, and all of the hidden eggs were found. This cost of the event was covered by board members and friends of the society. Your board has already decided that the Easter Egg hunt will be an annual event. This year the event was held on Palm Sunday.





The Madeira Historical Society Officers and board members, decided that our organization needed a second source of revenue, in addition to our investments. Past fundraising has included raffles that were always successful, but the board set their sights higher this year. A raffle with more prizes, better prizes, and a fundraiser that could begin at the Madeira Art Fair and end at the Madeira Street Dance was initiated. Members of the board solicited prizes from Madeira and from outside the community. We found a lot of support and publicized every business on our raffle tickets. Ultimately, seven prize baskets were created containing the donated prize items. A complete list can be viewed on our website. The society mailed out 6 – 12 raffle tickets to every member of the society that could be purchased or sold to others. It is hoped that our raffle will raise \$10,000 that will be used for budgeted, and in some cases, unbudgeted costs, all related to the continued maintenance and upkeep of the Miller House Museum and the society. Early sales results give us reason to be optimistic.
